

With the cancellation of this years Empire State Winter Games, the committee is moving forward with naming an athlete of the year.

Athlete of the Year Overview.

The Empire State Winter Games will present the first annual Athlete of the Year award to an athlete who (a) has participated in the Games before or for whom 2021 would have been their first year competing (b) exemplifies sportsmanship, leadership, community service, academic excellence, and overall what it means to be an Empire State Winter Games Athlete and (c) is a New York State resident.

Coaches across all 30+ ESWG sports are encouraged to submit nominations for consideration. 1 finalist will be chosen from each sport by the respective **ESWG Sport Coordinator** based on predetermined and uniform criteria. Finalists will then proceed to submit a video for Empire State Winter Games to share on social media where the ESWG community will vote (based on likes) to crown the overall Athlete of the Year.

Video submissions are open to interpretation but they should state why the athlete believes they deserve to represent ESWG as the Athlete of the Year. It can be funny, it can be film from competing, it can be a speech, etc.

Coaches will nominate their athletes based on the following criteria • Sportsmanship • Teamwork • Focus and Discipline • Positive attitude and enthusiasm for their sport both on and off the ice • Community Involvement and Leadership

High School Nordic Season Underway!!!!

The High School Nordic season kicked off on December 30th at Crandall Park with the first race of the season in Section 2. In a strange reversal of snow conditions, Crandall Park has had some of the best natural snow skiing in the state. The full 5K course was open for racing and the athletes had a great day. Varsity, Junior Varsity, and Modified racers skated in great conditions.

The Queensbury boys ended up winning the team competition followed by Mayfield and Johnsburg. In the girls team competition, Mayfield was the winner followed by Queensbury and third place Guilderland. Meet 2 was held at Gore Mountain Nordic Center on January 5th. Skiers were welcomed by great snow on a 1.5K loop for a

4.5 K race. In the boys competition, Queensbury was first followed by Lake George and then Saratoga. In the girls competition, Mayfield was first followed by Queensbury and then Shendehowa.

Racing has also kicked off in Section 5. Section 5 is racing in 3 team meets for the season. No word on results as of now but Honeoye Falls-Lima for the boys and Brighton for the girls look to be the teams to beat

As of now racing has not begun in Section 3, 7, or 9. We look forward to seeing all teams around the state have the opportunity to race in a safe and healthy environment.

In Person racing has started for NYSSRA Nordic

The first in person races of the vear were held on January 3 and 4 at the Gore Mountain Nordic Center. Saturday hosted a classic race with Bill Koch, Juniors, and Senior/Master racers. 45 racers toed the line on Saturday to kick off the season. Races were run with a rolling start where racers were given a time window in which to start. Racers could start at their comfort level at any time in this window. Racers seemed pleased with the socially distanced start method and had a great day of racing. On Sunday over 70 racers regis-

tered for a skate race on the 1.5K loop. Once again we used the rolling start and you will see more of this throughout the year of racing. Racers from around the state competed in races from 1.5K for the BKSL, 5K for

U16, and 7.5K for U18, Senior, and Masters.

Racing will continue this weekend with the GHN-ADK Skate on Saturday and Shenendehowa Classic races on Sunday at Gore Mountain Nordic Center. Next weekend racing continues with the Winona Forest Try it races held on Saturday January 23rd.

Racing is being held in a more relaxed environment with the ability to be safe while still getting out to enjoy the sport we all love.
